A good unit has a large contingent of well-trained leaders, working a good plan.

Does this mean units that do not have this are a failure? **NO!!** But, how many times have you felt lost in trying to get everything done? And then, how many times have you felt exasperated trying to bring new people in? If these questions sound familiar, then your U/C will be your best friend. U/C help with recruitment, are aware of training opportunities, and can advise on the development of an annual plan. If this sounds good, contact the wonderful people listed below. Also, consider increasing Unit attendance at Roundtable. There are many exciting things done on the first Thursday of the Month.

What Makes a Trained Leader?

Fast Start training is the first step for any new volunteer and will help them get started and lay the groundwork for their leadership roles. It is also a requirement for the leader training award.

Cub Scout leaders are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials and the Cub Scout Leader Specific training for their position.

Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials, Scoutmaster and Assistant Scoutmaster Leader Specific Training, and Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills.

Troop Committee members are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials and the Troop Committee Leader Specific training.

Varsity Scout leaders and assistants are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials, Varsity Scout Leader Specific Training, and Introduction of Outdoor Leader Skills.

Venturing crew Advisors, Assistant Advisors, and Crew Committee members are considered trained when they have completed New Leader Essentials and Venturing Leader Specific training.

Training schedules will be developed with the district calendar and published at roundtables and in the District newsletter. Be prepared to incorporate training into you unit program as a regular activity.

St. Philip Presbyterian Church in Hurst

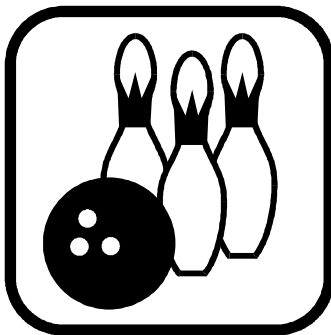
