National Youth Leader Training Course (NYLT) New!

Training of the youth leaders in a troop is important in helping the individual Scout and the troop grow. The Boy Scouts of America have developed a training experience that has proven very valuable in the training of junior leaders. It is called National Youth Leader Training Conference. Here in the Longhorn Council we call it "Twin Arrows" and you are invited to recommend Scouts to participate in the July 2004 course.

The purpose of Twin Arrows NYLT is to assist you in training your boy leaders. The Twin Arrows Troop works as an ideal troop using the patrol method and rotating leadership responsibility. Twin Arrows is not designed to teach basic Scout skills, which participants should already have, it strives to develop in a Scout the leadership techniques to "keep the patrol together and get the job done right". Please help us make this training more effective by recommending Scouts who are prepared and in need of this special leadership training.

Requirements: To attend, a Scout is required to have experience in camping, cooking, and first aid skills, and must have his First Class rank (dates specific to each course).

The Council Day Camp Committee and the Activities Committee will hold BB and Archery Training for Cub Scout leaders on April 18, April 24, and May 29. In order to qualify for the training, Cub Leaders must agree to serve as range officers at least 3 days or 3 weekends at Cub Scout Day Camp or at district or council weekend events like Cub Shootouts, Family Adventures, or Fall Festival. The purpose of the class is to train instructors for Day Camps and events.

New BB or Archery Instructors who serve 3 days at Cub Scout Day Camps, Resident Camps, or weekend events may reserve Council BB and Archery equipment at LHC camps to run a Longhorn Council certified BB or archery program for a Pack

at a council camp (only on camp property) under the supervision of the camp ranger. The BB and Archery equipment may not be used off camp property except for district and council events.

Rock Climbing Training (& Rock/Tower Recert. Classes)

April 22-24, 2005

This course is designed to certify ADULTS to lead climbing and rappelling activities for their units on rock. Completion of this training qualifies the participant as a BSA Instructor, able to lead single or multi-unit activities at any location. Course is Friday evening through late Sunday afternoon at SR2. There is no class size limit, but pre-registration is required. Course participants may also get a Tower card on Sunday afternoon. 4-hour Rock and Tower Recert classes are held Saturday at 8:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. Re-Certification courses are ONLY offered to currently certified Instructors who are coming up on their renewal time.

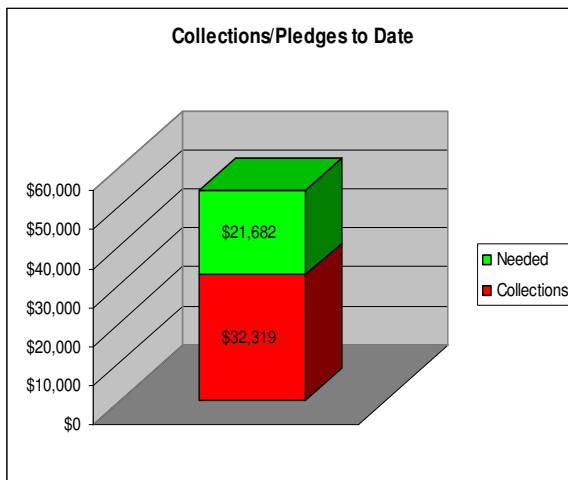
As of April 2nd, we have completed 35 presentations and have collected close to 60% of the District's goal of \$54,000.

Take a water break on the trail every 20 minutes or so.

Bring the Scout Essentials.

You didn't bring anything to write with?

Do a good turn daily.

"Boy run" does not mean "anything goes"

Wisdom comes from experience, experience comes from making mistakes.

It ain't Training without RAINING.

Where's your Handbook?

Dress in layers.

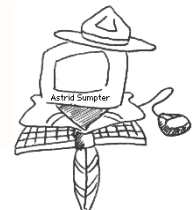
